I hope you have had a good summer. During the summer my niece and her family visited us, and we went to Walker's park near the parsonage. The 4 year old daughter of my niece said, "Look at me, grandpa. See how high I can swing." It was a voice that rose high at the playground. Yet, in its words was a whole view of life shared by most of us, children or adults. "Look at me. See how high I can go."

Everyone wants to go high and sits in the high position. In the bible, however, Jesus often points us in another direction. We have the world going in one direction and Jesus going in another. We want to take a place of honor at a dinner party, but Jesus tells us to take a lowest place. Counter-cultural!

No boundaries are drawn in human life more clearly than around the dinner table. To admit a person to a table with you is to admit him/her as a full, equal human being, just like you. Something happens when people sit next to one another at a table. A bond is formed, community, communion.

If we are Christians, and if we are Jesus' followers, we must eat and drink as he ate and drank. When we join Jesus at his table, we are required to rethink our goals and our ambitions. In this culture we are taught to desire to sit at the head table. However, Jesus, at the table, reforms our desires and teaches us another way of being together. If we are to be at the table with Jesus, then we must be there on his terms.

For me, as a pastor, one of the great joys is the Lord's Supper. The highlight for me is when you come forward and kneel at the rail, as if you were seeking a gift. As each of you receives the piece of bread and a cup, for me that is a holy moment. Some of us are able, accomplished people, and some of us are not. Some of us have our achievements, and some of us do not. Some of us are financially secure, and some of us are not.

Yet at the Lord's Supper, we are the same, kneeling and receiving the same elements, regardless of how much we have achieved or possessed. We are equal to each other. I think that is a holy moment and a metaphor for how life should be lived under God. What is better, Christ comes to us at the Lord's Supper. He puts bread in our empty hands. He fills us with food for the abundant life. Then, he urges us to go and invite others to his great banquet.

As we begin the autumn, let us try to attend the worship service as often as possible. We celebrate the Lord's Supper on the first Sunday of the month, September 2nd. Let us come to worship, experience the presence of Jesus Christ at the Lord's Table, and share the love as sisters and brothers in Christ. Amen.

REPORT ON NEW YORK ANNUAL CONFERENCE

In early June we attended a four day session of the New York Annual Conference at Hostra. During this annual meeting, we worship, study, and debate issues and set up a budget for the next year.

We delivered our 24 Health kits (3771 kits collected) and 2 bags of baby clothes for the Women's' Advocate Ministry

For the Bible study a storytelling format was used, with young children as the audience. They used the Parable of the Good Samaritan, with small group discussions following.

For the legislative sessions, I went to sections 5, which looks at Health Insurance and the budget. Both hot issues, health costs keep going up. They have cut the total budget, but because NYAC is also merging 4 churches into 2 and discontinued 6 congregations, the amount of apportionments continues to rise. Millie attended Section 3, Ministries of Advocacy, centering on minority ministries.

Despite the closing of the small rural churches, a charter was given to a new church in Manhattan, Flushing Chinese UMC.

Collections were taken for Black College fund, \$4578; Women's Advocate Ministry, \$4569. Imagine No Malaria Fund, \$182,787 and Ministerial Education Fund, \$5223.

We celebrated the retirement of pastors and the commissioning and ordination of new pastors.

Saturday has been set aside for a program designed to attract young people. This year they were raising funds to wipe out malaria by, the program involved transformers, fast music and the children loved it. And a lot of money was raised!

The Conference went very smoothly, weather was perfect. A great ending for Bishop Jeremiah Park as he departs New York, Connecticut.
