SERVING WITH JOY!

The wrapping paper and bows are in the trash. The tree is headed to the curb. And now our attention turns to the New Year.

This marks an exciting time in our journey as a Church. In 2016, we're launching new ministries that will expand our reach in the community. The goal is to revitalize our mission, inspire our existing membership and attract new faces to our church family. Here is an overview—more details are included inside the Spire.

Impact Bay Shore. The Rev. Dyanne Blair-Pina and longtime member Dale Dowd will be hosting a series of discussions that aim to help us find peace in a troubled world. Located at the Bay Shore-Brightwaters Library, the sessions will look at scripture and other teachings that aim to inform and inspire.

Neighborly Ministry. In response to the increasing number of homeless people loitering and sleeping on church property, I will be undertaking a one-one-one ministry right outside our walls. Meeting with the homeless and offering communion and prayers, when desired, is the first step in helping homeless here. Short term, we will be providing information about resources and Care Kits. Longer term, we hope to enlist a number of local houses of worship to provide temporary shelter.

Elder Reach. Let's not forget our homebound members—the loyal, hard-working congregants who have helped sustain us throughout the decades. While most receive regular home visits and communion, I would like to rekindle their fellowship with each other. Starting this month, we will launch a conference-call ministry so that shut-ins can worship, study and share with each other.

Interfaith Youth. In the works is a plan to connect Bay Shore-area teens with each other with a series of open houses hosted by churches and other houses of worship. The goal is to engage and foster peace and harmony in the world—something all people of all races and faiths strive for.

It is no secret that our church has been struggling to fill both the pews and its coffers. If we expect to survive in the coming years, we must try new things. Let me emphasize again: Continuing with the same-old, same-old will only ensure our demise.

In 2016, I ask you to consider the long list of tasks and traditions that take place here. Is it time for some things to go away? Are there other ways to do them more efficiently?

Streamlining has an added benefit: It allows us to break the cycle of overwork, burnout, resentment and drop-out that is increasingly occurring here. Doing fewer things and doing them well will enable members to leave anger and bitterness behind and serve with joy.

My theme for 2016 will be Serving With Joy. Let's rethink our routines and try new things, even knowing that some things will fail. Our successes will be made all the sweeter knowing that we are becoming closer to God and, with God's help, revitalizing our church.

YUM YUM FUN





INTRODUCING ELDER REACH

Starting early this year, we're launching an Elder Reach ministry to help connect longtime members who are unable to come to church. The goal is to provide fellowship to shut-ins and senior members who have moved away, bringing them back into the fold of our church family.

I'll be leading a conference-call Bible study once a week, with sessions lasting between a half-hour to an hour. Linda Napolitano will be joining me in this venture, furthering the relationships we have developed with regular elder visits and communion.

We plan to provide an occasional "elder update" during Sunday services and in the Spire. As this ministry evolves, we hope to discover other ways that homebound members can remain active in our church and community. We're always looking for ideas and inspiration, so let me know if you would like to get involved. – Pastor Wendy.



PROJECT HOMELESS - A PARKING LOT MINISTRY

An increasing number of homeless people and loiterers are spending their days – and nights – on Church property. Their presence, though mostly harmless, potentially puts children enrolled in our Childcare, their parents as well as members of our congregation at risk. With the harsh winter weather, we have a two-part plan to ensure that everyone – including the homeless – is safe.

Phase I: Pastor Wendy will, when feasible, meet with individuals loitering on church property, hear their concerns, pray with them, and offer communion. Each person will be given a card that explains why they cannot loiter on church property. It will also contain information on nearby soup kitchens (including our own), food pantries, veterans' services and temporary housing programs.

Individuals who have no living accommodations will also be given a Care Kit with shampoo/body wash, shaving cream/razor, toothbrush/toothpaste, deodorant and cheese crackers. Funds for the Care Kits were generously donated by Long Island Rocks for the Homeless and Veterans. Thanks also to members of our Girl Scout troop who packaged the Care Kits for easy distribution.

Loiterers will then be respectfully asked to leave church property and informed that we will have to call local authorities if they do not comply.

Phase II: Along with other houses of worship in the Bay Shore area, we will explore an ecumenical approach to homelessness. For example, in the Town of Huntington, about two dozen houses of worship provide overnight lodging to homeless people on a rotating basis. A fact-finding task force will determine resources – space, staffing, funding, feasibility – for this effort.
