### **ROAD BLOCK? – MOVE FORWARD!**

The Exodus story is so fascinating. It shows a picture of how God literally saves God's people, physically as well as spiritually. The battle that started in Egypt culminated in confrontation at the Red Sea; the conflict between the LORD versus the Pharaoh and all his armies.

The LORD purposely led the Israelites the long and difficult path, where they would be stuck between a rock and a hard place. Have you ever felt that you are at a dead-end, a standstill, and the only way out is to turn back? However, turning back is not an option because behind are the things that you left in order to forge ahead.

I presume that's how the Israelites felt when they got to the Red Sea and saw the mountains on both sides and Pharaoh's armies on hot pursuit. They were enclosed without an escape route. Sometimes God leads us in difficult places – cul-de-sac, so God can get the glory when the people realize that God is in control of the seas and all things!

They did what any of us would have done in their situation, they cried out to the LORD in fear and desperation. Since Moses was the intermediate to God, they asked him, "Have you brought us out here to die?" God said to Moses tell the Israelites stop complaining and move forward.

As they obeyed God and moved towards the Red Sea, God opened a passage in the Sea; God divided the sea so they walked through safely on dry land. God controlled the sea by God's breath, the waters became congealed, two walls on either sides as they went through.

In his book, "The Red Sea: 10 God-Given Strategies for Difficult Times," Robert J. Morgan said, "The same God who led you in will lead you out." God will never bring us to a place and leave us alone. Even when it seems like you are at a blind-alley,

Morgan said, "Realize that God means for you to be where you are."

Don't turn back! Keep moving forward, by faith. The LORD will make a way so you can get through your roadblock.

## Soup Kitchen Thanksgiving Dinner



# Pledge Campaign 2017

As United Methodists, we covenant (promise) five things to bring to God's Service as participants in this congregation. These are our prayers, our presence, our gifts, our service, and our witness.

So what exactly is a pledge - and what relationship does it have to bringing our gifts to the Church?

A pledge is your personal goal for monetary giving to the Church in the coming year:

- It is confidential only two people in the church see the individual pledges.
- It in no way affects your standing in the Church this is guaranteed by the rules of United Methodism.
- Finally, it is non-binding. We are here to serve the poor, not make you poor O. We are only interested in the amount you can give freely and joyfully and not a penny more. If that amount changes during the year, so can your pledge.

So why pledge? The Bible asks it of us. Proverbs 3:9 advises "Honor the Lord with your wealth, with the first fruits of all your crops." Now most of us aren't farmers anymore but the principle is the same. Pledging is a way of saying "I am going to make a priority of returning a portion of the bounty the Lord has provided to His Service, not just give what is left over."

In Matthew 6:21, Jesus says "Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." Pledging is one way we put "skin in the game" and commit ourselves to support our Church.

Because of God's sustaining grace and all those who have supported our Church with their gifts and service and prayers, our finances have improved in 2016. With your help, we hope to continue this trend in 2017 and remain an active and outward facing Church that serves God and our neighbors.

Think about all the wonderful things our Church does with our gifts. We provide a sacred space for the worship of a loving and forgiving God – and for Fellowship with one another. We come here to celebrate and consecrate the most joyful events of our lives – and for comfort in the most difficult times. Church is a place for spiritual development – and a source of direction and hope when our lives are confusing and burdened.

Our Church is a place where change begins - both within ourselves and in the larger world because of our support for over 30 mission projects with scopes that range from local to global.

Our Church has done all these things and more, not just this year but for 206 years because every year people like us decided to make it so with their prayers and their presence and their gifts and their service and their witness. Now it is our choice whether we will with God's help continue these things into the future for the benefit of ourselves and all those who come after us.

If we choose as wisely as those saints who have come before us, Jesus promised "Give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap; for the measure you give will be the measure you get back" (Luke 6:38).

All that you are and all that you have is God's gift to you. What you choose to do with those things is your gift to God. The fact that you pledge is more important than the amount you pledge. We ask that you prayerfully consider your personal circumstances, fill out the pledge form with an amount you can freely and joyfully give, and return it to the church office or at any Worship offering.

The blessing of pledges will take place Sunday November 20<sup>th</sup>, but we will gratefully accept pledges at any time. Thank you for your consideration of this request - and for being a unique and valued part of our little corner of God's Universal Church.
